

ONE OF MY challenges to everyone at the start of this fraternal year was to have every council active.

What does that mean? It means simply every council needs to add one new member to their roster, and they are considered being active. This should not be a major issue with all the programs we are doing and all the supportive programs and training tools provided by Supreme.

However, we still have over 40% of our councils that have yet to being in a single new member this year and we are almost at the halfway mark of this fraternal year.

My Wisconsin goal from Supreme is to be at 50% of our annual target by December 31st. Our annual goal is 1229 new members, so 50% would be approximately 614. As of November 26th, we are at 402 or 32%.

Our Winter District Deputy meeting is scheduled for December 6th – 8th in Steven Point. All the District Deputies are required to

bring a report on their district's performance to date, and to report on why certain councils are struggling to bring in at least one new member, when we have other councils that have already surpassed their yearly intake goal as early as October. All of the State Officers, Directors and District Deputies are ready and willing to help you succeed.

My sincere thanks and appreciation to all of you who have taken my initiative to heart and are getting ahead of the curve on timely compliance of your reports & member intake. You are On Mission! By being active and effective in our Programs, Church and Community, we can become the Fishers of Men that Blessed Father McGivney laid out for this organization in 1882. Let's not let him down at this critical time in our country where our faith is being challenged, and our men & families are being disillusioned. Men are



willing to join an organization where they can bond & share a common desire to maintain & stand up for their Catholic Faith.

All we have to do is ask! Think back to when you were approached about joining the Knights of Columbus. What was your motivation to join? It worked for you; it can work for others.

Those councils that have not yet brought in a new member, are you ready to step into the breach? We want to ensure that this great organization will continue to support the poor and less fortunate for another 140+ years!

When was the last time you asked a man to join? If never, why not? It's never too late to start.

AS CHRISTMAS APPROACHES, I am grateful for each of you and your ongoing commitment to the Knights of Columbus in Wisconsin.

I COME TO YOU this month, writing this article while attending our Winter District Deputy meeting as the leaders across our State come together to discuss how we close this calendar year as well as this Fraternal Year on another successful path for the Knights in Wisconsin. Often we talk about 'new programs' and 'new ideas' and ways to grow our programs and membership in the Knights. Growth and 'innovative' ways to grow is always a challenge but something we should strive to do as a way to overcome the challenges we are faced with. But oftentimes, what has also worked in the past is also something that we

should reflect back on and what a treat the District Deputies had this weekend hearing from Past State Deputy, Wenzel Felber.

For those of you who are not aware, Wenzel Felber was State Deputy from 1998-2000. During that time, not only did Wenzel achieve membership growth in our State which is a rare feat (offsetting deaths and suspensions we have each day, with new members) but he was the last State Deputy during the time that our Membership in our State was over 40,000 members. As of this writing, we are just under 34,500 members in our state, a decline of almost 15% from where

our membership was approximately 25 years ago. Wenzel took time to talk about 'what worked' during his time, simple messages and ways to motivate and engage our council leaders. I'm sure some of you will be seeing in the coming week(s) and month(s) some of these concepts put into action by your District Deputies as the presentation was very well received. It's important sometimes to 'go back to basics' of what has worked in the past, and what we can easily implement back into action to set us on the right path.

Throughout the coming weeks you will also hear more and more about

being 'ON MISSION' as this is a charge that was presented to all of us by Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly at this year's Supreme Convention as well as reinforced by State Deputy Patrick Reiff this weekend. Being 'ON MISSION' means that we need to not only focus on improving our Programs and the good works of charity that we do in the Knights, but also to 'INVITE OTHERS' to join in this Mission. Over 7 million Catholic eligible men have NEVER been invited to join the Knights, but would consider joining based off of a nationwide Pew survey. What a tremendous opportunity we have this Advent season and Lenten season and beyond to be MISSIONARIES for the Knights and our Mission by inviting every eligible Catholic man to join our good works.

Finally, our District Deputies received some great informational statistics on each of your Councils. This information ranges from your council's average age, to your membership over the past 3 years, to the age demographics of each of

your Council. If your Council ever has questions on this information or if you are wanting any specific help with the challenges your council has in growing membership, please reach out directly to your District Deputy, your Diocesan Leaders and your State Officers and State leaders like myself, as we are excited, motivated, and willingly able to assist you in reaching your goals!

As we are now in the season of Advent. I also wanted to mention a recent homily I heard that spoke about how Advent isn't just a 'PREPARATION' for the coming of Christ, but how every season we are in preparation for what is to come. The Birth of Christ, the Death of Christ, as well as our own 'PREPARATION' for the coming of Christ upon our death. This really struck me, as a comment we sometimes heard recently is how councils were 'too busy' to conduct membership activities or meetings at it is the 'Advent' season in our church and how our time needs to be spent preparing for this. But every day is a 'PREPARATION' throughout our liturgical year and within our councils in our Fraternal



Year to help ensure that each of us is PREPARED to meet Jesus Christ in heaven. # **ONLINE MEMBERSHIP IPSD JOHN HUTTENHOFF**

AS OF NOVEMBER 20, we have assigned a total of 229 new Emembers since July 1, an increase of 63 in 5 weeks. Thank you.

Currently, Councils have transferred 147 E-members into Councils this Fraternal Year. Roughly 49% of Council Intake this year has been through E-members. We are still a bit behind where we would like to be here.

A major focus this quarter is to get Every Council and Every District Active. We currently have 45 pending e-members from last year, and 81 more pending e-members from this year, assigned to 75 Councils in 40 Districts. If we can Exemplify these 126 E-members and get them into Councils, it would significantly increase the number of Active Councils and Districts.

Grand Knights and Financial Secretaries can find these Assigned E-members on their Prospects Tab in Officers Online. Please make it a priority to reach out to these Emembers this month and bring them into your Councils via an Exemplification.

As you are doing your programs & church drives, be sure to include the E-membership online invita\(\text{O}\) on app in your invitation process to potential members.

WGK & WFS please frequently review your councils **Prospect** tab. If you are having difficulty in making contact, or any other issue, please email me regarding these outstanding assigned e-member and I will gladly assist you with reaching a remedy.

Remember: The **Prospect** tab shows you e-members that have joined your council online via the Supreme app. and the date field is used when they have completed their exemplification. The **Prospect** tab is available here.

Supreme will be offering a Webinar in December on Transferring online members to council membership - The webcast will be at 7PM on 12/12/24. Here is the <u>link</u> to register for that.

The Candidate tab is what you use when you recruit a member locally or are handling a member transfer request or a reinstatement of a prior



member. The candidate tab training covers new members and transfers into local councils.

Again, the date field is the date they were exemplified by your council. Once you enter those dates in either tab, the members will be automatically transferred to your council's roster within the next week.

Do not send Form 100's to Supreme for new members. Keep them for your council records. If you must use a Form 100, scan it and email it to Supreme; keep the Original for your Council Records.

WE ARE ENTERING into the Advent season as you're reading this. Advent is the period of preparation for the coming of our Lord on December 25th. This year, Supreme is offering some wonderful Advent and Christmas programs for us to take part in as Councils or Individuals.

**Sons in the Son.** Restoring our sonship through concentration to Our Lady of Guadalupe. This program is designed to restore the Gift of Sonship in God the Father through companionship with Our Lady of Guadalupe and St. Juan Diego. The program helps us restore Our Sonship, Our Communion with God in Prayers, Our Masculinity, Our Actions in Attitudes through the Beatitudes, and Our Mission. The full program can be started on either November 2nd ending with the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe,

November 22nd ending with the Feast of Mary the Mother of God, February 13th ending in the Annunciation, or July 6th ending with the Assumption. Even if you were unable to start on the official start date of this program you can hop aboard by visiting this link.

Advent Reflections. When our Faith is first, everything else falls in order. Through a series of videos the Knights of Columbus seeks to refocus us this Advent in Christ. There is a series of short 5- minute videos reflecting on the Advent season that can be shared in a group men's discussion group, and meeting or viewed as individuals for us to reflect upon. #### Spread the Light of Christ.

Organize an event with your pastor to light up a Christmas tree, your Church, or a Nativity Scene and have them blessed. This can include Religious Christmas caroling and other activities focusing upon the true meaning of Christmas being the birth or our Lord.

**National Wreaths across America** Day this year is Saturday December 14th 2024 an opportunity to show our respect and appreciation to Veterans. Find a participating cemetery near you volunteer to place the wreaths, help finance this mission, and help keep the reason for Christmas in this by helping create a program remembering the birth of our Lord.

#### Concentration to the Holy Family.

On December 29th is not that far away. While this is normally a Family Program it does fall to the foundation of our Faith. If you have not done so yet start preparing now publicize it to the families of the parish, order the prayer cards, and start organizing a luncheon to follow the concentration to get the families together for socialization and discussion. Having some family entertainment is also recommended to help attract families with an appropriate video.

**Journey to the Inn.** Traditionally, nine consecutive nights remembering the journey to Bethlehem. This program can be



done with youth as a Family program or with adults as a faith program. The main purpose of the program is to remind people of the religious connection in preparing for Christmas being more important than the secular shopping season. While the program normally runs for nine days, it can be condensed to even a single day celebration. Simply type in: "Journey to the Inn" at the Supreme web site in the search window to get various links to this historical program.

Solemnity of the Immaculate **Conception** is December 9th. If you can celebrate a mass followed by a supper and consider a candlelight procession with a rosary and singing. When did you have your last Eucharistic Procession? Discuss with your pastor he would consider or if you have a considerable Hispanic membership having it on the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe on December 12th.

The Jubilee Year will offer the faithful opportunities to participate in various iubilee events at the Vatican and in their own diocese. The great tradition of opening the Holy Door will begin when Pope Francis opens the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica on December 24, 2024. Each diocese will have their

own celebration for the opening of the Holy Year at the time we proceed from Advent to the Christmas the season.

**RSVP Program.** Remember that it is a custom for our Councils to support our Seminarians as much as possible. This includes praying for them, inviting them to our meetings and social events to show them our support and helping them financially. Supreme wants to encourage this program by returning assistance to the Councils and Assemblies that support our seminarians by reimbursing them with \$100.00 for every \$500 they donate to a seminarian. Remember you need to complete two forms for full credit and the reimbursement of forms. Form 2863 RSVP refund Application with a copy of the checks needs to be submitted to Supreme. Form #10784 Fraternal Programs Report needs to be submitted as well to Supreme.

Remember to also copy and submit a copy of all forms to the state at Forms@wikofc.com to receive state credit and a back up if questions pop up.

All icons must be at the State Office before the weekend of December 7th. If you still have an icon make sure your District Deputy takes it the Winter District Deputies meeting.

Come early 2025 Supreme has promised us a new Item of the Sacred Heart which will be rotated. When we receive them

I'll release the schedule for rotation. As this is the first Rotation of the Sacred Heart Icon I believe it will rotate much more smoothly.

Easter is getting closer to us every day. Now is the time to start planning your Councils activities for Lent that Starts on Ash Wednesday on March 5th and Easter Sunday April 20th. What is a better way to celebrate the season of the first Eucharist than a Eucharistic Procession through your town on Easter Day? Does your Parish have a Canopy? There has been a lot of discussion about the Safe Haven Baby Boxes and how the KofCs can get involved. Currently, Elkhorn will be cutting the ribbon at their firehouse located at 13 S. Broad St., Elkhorn, on Monday, November 25th at 3pm. Anyone is welcome to attend the ribbon cutting! Also, Racine is ready to go as well, but I have not heard when the ribbon cutting will be exactly. I am told that Sturgeon Bay is organizing one at their local hospital!

1. Money. If your council wants to sponsor an installation, in full, or in part, you can do that through Safe Haven Baby Box, Inc. directly, or with Pro-Life Wisconsin, who has set up a grant fund for the endeavor. If you want to sponsor a specific project, it has to have a signed contract with Safe Haven Baby Boxes, Inc. If you simply

want to sponsor the effort in general, you can direct your checks to Pro-Life Wisconsin with "Baby Box" in the memo section. As the projects come together and are looking for funding, we will grant funds from that pool of donations as they make themselves known to us. If you have a donor who wants the tax write off, have him or her send their donation either to Safe Haven Baby Boxes, Inc. and have them earmark it for a Baby Box in Wisconsin, or to Pro-Life Wisconsin, with Baby Box in the memo line of your check.

2. Get the ball rolling in your community to have one installed! Start with your fire chief. These boxes must be installed in an area that is manned 24/7/365 – which usually means a police station, hospital ER or the local fire station. For guidance on where to start, call

Now is the time we can step up and lead that needed push to aid them in their work.

There's a great need for those wheelchairs in Ukraine, the Middle East, Haiti, Africa and Asian areas, etc. Wisconsin according to Supreme, does very little with this program. It's only \$150 for a chair. Come on – let's step up and help out - see the Supreme website for more information.

I'll address Helping Hands more in January. My main focus this month, however, is on Disaster Preparedness. Certainly, many in the western Carolinas, Florida, Georgia, eastern Tennessee, etc. never expected to see the devastation from Hurricanes Helene and Milton, but it came. With climate change, we in much of Wisconsin may one day incur the same unexpected damage from floods, tornadoes, winter storms, etc. we never thought possible. Thus, it's certainly appropriate that we work with our parishes and community organizations, local

government agencies, schools, etc. to set the groundwork for response to such and be sure it's up to date! For more information, check the Supreme website and with our State Disaster Response

Chair, Paul Shepherd. In addition, you may want to hold a fundraiser and/or make a substantial donation to the Supreme Disaster Relief Fund or

the State Fund. Recent issues of Columbia

magazine have highlighted the work of the Knights in these hardhit areas (also Tim Nowak's recent newsletters).

On the other side of the coin, there are also 4 "Youth" programs in the "Community" portion

of F.i.A., namely: 1) Free Throw, 2) Catholic Citizenship Essay Contest, 3) Soccer Challenge, 4)

Hockey Skills Challenge. For the Citizenship Essay Contest, students should be completing their essay entries by Nov. 30. Councils are to receive them by Dec. 15, grade them and get winners to your Diocesan Program Coordinator by Jan. 1.

Council Soccer Challenge results should be sent to your DPC when completed as should Hockey Challenge results. These contests can be run at any time outdoors or indoors. Diocesan and State Contests (the need for them) will be determined by the number of results that are reported. Diocesan and State winners will be chosen accordingly.

The Free Throw (and Knowledge) Contests should be planned now, needed supplies ordered and sites, dates and times selected. Council contests can be held any time from December-March 2 for Free Throw; March 20 for Knowledge. District Free Throw Contest window is March 7-23. Diocesan Contests for both events will be held March 29-April 20. The State Finals are planned

for Assumption High School in Wisconsin Rapids on Saturday, May 3. Updated packet information for Free Throw and Knowledge Contests is now on the State website. Updated tests will be available on the secure portion of the State website by mid-December.

The "Culture of Life" Essay Contest will again be in January-February. Updated topic and instruction packets will be on the State website by mid-December. Start now to secure permission from schools, parishes, etc. Essays will be due to Councils by Feb. 15, graded and winners sent to your DPCs by March 1.

Finally, the State PPK Finals were held at Newman High School in Wausau on Saturday, Nov. 9. Some 65 student-athletes competed - great atmosphere, good weather, fine help from Council 1069, District 28 and La Crosse Diocese! Results are on the State website. We plan to be back there in 2025.

Newsworthy • Broad Appeal • Concide • Complete • Factual • Accurate Answers the Questions: Who, What, When, Where, Why, & How

- > Articles should contain a minimum of 300 words (ideal) but no more than 600 words max. Articles that are longer than this may be shortened by the editor.
- ▶ Articles should be submitted to the State Secretary by email as a Word document attahment.
  - ▶ PDF submissions are for **ads** or **promotions**, not **articles**.
- ▶ Pictures need to be sent separately as an attachment and the original pictures. Include photo information and credits. **Please do not format them in any way; we will do it.** Do not embed them within your Word document. Consider providing photos whenever possible. It makes the newsletter more interesting to look at and read.
- ▶ Articles need to be brief, highly relevant, and actionable.
- ▶ At a minimum, Who, What, When and Where needs to be in the **first** paragraph.
- ▶ Articles need to be brief, to-the-point and **of interest** to the entire State Council:
  - What is the event/activity about?
  - Whom did it benefit?
  - What was the result?
  - Who are the key players/Knights?
- ▶ Similar story submissions will be consolidated/batched into one article by the editor.
- > Authors must submit on time for each issue, which is the last day of the calendar month. Late submissions will be placed farther down the newsletter or not published.
- ▶ Proofread your article carefully for spelling and grammar before sending (use spellcheck or a software such as Grammarly). **Advice:** read your articles out loud to get a sense of tone.
- ▶ There is no need to put two spaces after periods for new sentences. That is an outdated method!
- ▶ Please name your filenames with your name, title, and newsletter month (e.g. Hopper, Joshua Editor Jan24).
- ▶ Please send me any questions at jjhoppermusic@gmail.com. I always accept feedback and recommendations on ways I can improve the newsletter, though I can not guarantee all ideas will be able to be implemented.
