A Call A Call

WHO WAS SAINT ELIZABETH ANN SETON?

Many of you may be familiar with the story of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton's life. She was raised in an aristocratic Episcopalian family and married man from wealth. She had children with him and decided God had called her to be a fine wife to her husband and a good mother to her children. Then tragedy struck. The family importing business failed and her husband died of tuberculosis. In her time of grief, she found great comfort from her Catholic friends and converted to Catholicism. After a period of grief, she took over a secular school. When some people discover she has become a Catholic they remove their children from the school. Eventually the school became quite successful. Women join her in educational efforts. The bishop encouraged Elizabeth Ann to found an order of religious women. They started the Catholic parochial school system in in the United State. If she had simply said to herself, "I will spend the rest of my days as a widow and a mother." there would be no Sisters of St. Charity of St. Joseph and who knows when or if Catholic schools would flourish in the United States. But this is not

the case. Instead of seeing her future as "this is what all women in my station always do" and that God was done with her, she was open to "a call within a call." She frequently told her sisters, "We do God's will because it is God's will."

Why do something new?

The Knights of Columbus have been around for a long time, and we have many members who have been members for a long time. The brat fries, the pancake breakfasts, the tootsie roll drives, the winter coat drives, the charitable grants, the emergency assistance programs, the support of seminarians, the pro-life efforts are all wonderful things. Some are quite visible, and others are things most folks know nothing about. But a common complaint from some members is, "Why can't we just do what we have always done?" Helping men stay close to Christ was at the heart of Blessed Michael McGivney's mission when he founded the Knights of Columbus. That is the call for all Knights, everywhere, all the time. Currently in the United States many men's mental and spiritual health are in a perilous state. Loneliness and isolation are

leading to abuse of alcohol and drugs, depression, and suicide among men in the United States. These patterns are registering at an alarming rate. Even men participating in parish life struggle to understand their roles as a Catholic husband, father, a worker, and a citizen. So, we, the Knights, are now experiencing "a call within a call."

What can we, as the Knights of Columbus, do to help men stay close to Christ?

After sizing up the situation, the Knights of Columbus have made a significant effort to create something new called Cor. Cor comes from the Latin word for heart. This program brings the heart of the matter to heart of Christ. This initiative gives men an opportunity to experience Christ-centered brotherhood through in-person gatherings centered on prayer, faith formation, and fraternity. Participants strengthen each other to become holy men, fine husbands, and great fathers and to engage in the mission of the Church. This is not a program exclusively for Knights. It is for all the men of the parish. This is not a method of recruiting new

members. It is a new way to realize the mission of Blessed Michael McGivney's mission: Helping men stay close to Christ. What are the elements of Cor? Meetings vary according to local parish setting. Groups of men meet for 60 to 90 minutes. This could be monthly, twice a month, or weekly. There are three elements. First, every Cor gathering includes a time of prayer that helps men form the habit of focusing their minds on God. Second, in order to become closer disciples of Jesus, each Cor gathering includes formation like Bible studies, small group discussions, and other formats so that participants learn from each

other how to imitate Christ. And third, there is time for fraternity. Cor establishes Christ-centered brotherhood where friendship is encouraged, and men build each other up in holiness and virtue.

What about you?

As state chaplain for the Knights of Columbus I had a fantastic opportunity in early September to participate in training leaders for Cor in New Haven. I am extremely impressed with the investment of staff in creating materials to train leaders for Cor gatherings. The faith sharing at small group tables was outstanding. After more than four and a half decades of life as a priest I know how effective Cor can be. What about you? Could you

please encourage your council take the first step and explore the possibility of establishing Cor with your parish priest? If you are conducting Cor gatherings, could you please offer reports about your activity? Lastly, could you include in your prayers to Blessed Michael McGiveny a special request for the success of Cor? This movement has filled me with hope. I am confident that it could do the same many men who want to Stay close to Christ and do not know how to get started.

DURING THE MONTH OF SEPTEMBER, myself and my State
Officer Team along with our
Supreme Regional Growth
Director, William Chasse
traveled throughout the five
dioceses of Wisconsin.

These meetings required your council's attendance, and I am pleased to say we had a very good turnout in

all five dioceses. In addition to distributing Charity Raffle tickets and the new State Directories, there was a great amount of fruitful dialog shared back & forth. I believe we all left more energized and ready to take on these new programs and challenges that were presented.

Growing the Order, Our Primary Mission.

In September we added 140 new men, which is 23 more than last September, a 20% increase. Our 1st Quarter, which ended on September 30th brought in 253 new brother knights. This is a 5% increase from last year's 1st Quarter.

July = 51 August = 62 September = 140. As we can see, the summer months of July & August continue to be a challenge but you came back in September like a lion and made up the difference to allow us to achieve our 1st Quarter goal. Great work, We are growing and keeping Blessed Father McGivney's mission alive!

Now that summer is over its time to continue growing like we did in September and offer the gift of membership to every eligible Catholic man we encounter during our Programs, events and church drives. Remember: We are here to help where it's needed. You don't have to do it alone.

In speaking of not having to do it alone, I can't always do it alone either. I need your help in identifying men to step up to the position of District Deputy for our open districts.

With the growth of our membership base & new councils being established, we need additional motivated men that want to take the next step in their advancement with the Knights and become an active contributor to our mission in supporting our councils and their membership.



SEPTEMBER WAS A MUCH BETTER MONTH FOR

Online Membership. As of September 26, we have assigned a total of 137 new E-members since July 1. This is about 62% of the pace that we need to meet our State Goals. So far Councils have transferred 62 E-members into Councils this Fraternal Year. Roughly 31% of Council Intake this year has been through E-members. This is a significant drop-off from the prior Fraternal Year. This seems due to a 33%

conversion rate which is half of what we have done in the past. We are better than this.

Cards with the QR Code to join online are available from Supreme. These can be very helpful when inviting men to join. Your Diocesan Membership Directors and District Deputies should be able to help you get these cards if you need them.

REMINDERS

WGK & WFS please frequently review your councils **Prospect** tab. Should you experience any difficulty with this process, please email me regarding these outstanding assigned e-members and I will gladly assist you.

Supreme presented a Webinar in December on Transferring online members to council membership which you can access here.

Do not send Form 100's to Supreme for new members, keep them for your council's records. If you must use a Form 100, scan it and email it to Supreme, keeping the original for your council records. Since Form 100's must be manually processed at Supreme, they can lead to data entry errors and delays. Utilizing emembership or the Candidate tab for new members are the preferred ways to bring in new members. The date field is the date they were exemplified by your council. Once you enter those dates in either tab, the members will be automatically transferred to your council's roster within the next week.

PROSPECT TAB

The **Prospect** tab shows you emembers that have joined online via the Supreme app. The date field is used to transfer them into your council when they have completed their exemplification. With e-membership, new members enter their own data and confirm their membership, and then they receive an e-mail from Supreme. These e-members are then part of the state council, and get assigned to a local council. Until the local FS enters the exemplification date, these members remain part of the State Council. Local councils get credit for them when the exemplification date is entered by the FS to transfer them into your Council

Clicking on this blue box will take you to the Prospect training.

CANDIDATE TAB

The **Candidate** tab is what you use when you recruit a member locally or are handling a member transfer request or a reinstatement of a prior member. The Candidate tab can best be described as an online Form 100. The candidate tab training covers new members and transfers into local councils

Clicking on this red box will take you to the candidate training.

As food prices continue to rise, an alarming number of people worldwide require assistance and rely on food pantries or soup kitchens to help feed their families. Encourage your council to get involved with our Food for Families program, which provides councils with a refund of \$100 for every \$500 dollars or 1,000 pounds they donate, up to \$500 per fraternal year. Please be aware of the new changes introduced for the 2025 Council FIA History Books. Timeline and new directions have been posted to the State Webpage for a time. An outline of the ne timeline is below.

Phase I - July 2025-Align to Fraternal Year, No changes to Authorship Format. No submissions to State Judging. GK and DI give recognition of effort at Local level. Council Books and Digital Publications will be welcome at 2026 Convention. The 2025 year book will contain council data from January 1st, 2025 to June 31s 2026. The

2026/27 book will then align to Fraternal Year July 1st to June 31

Phase II-Name change from History Book to New name. New Recognition program launch. Training and education to Councils Communicated December 2025-July 2026. Digital trial started.

Phase III-Continued promotion to educate Councils to archive fraternal year Council Mission. "Council XXXX Fraternal Year 2027 - Records of Service & Achievements" publication made available online and at 2027 Convention.

AS WE EMBARK ON A NEW FRATERNAL YEAR, the Fourth Degree across Wisconsin is moving forward with renewed energy and purpose. Both the Eastern and Western Districts are excited to announce the upcoming schedule of Fourth Degree Exemplifications, the ceremonial gateway through which our Third Degree Knights advance to the Patriotic Degree and commit themselves more visibly to service of Church and country.

Upcoming Exemplifications

Our exemplification calendar has been expanded to make it easier than ever for councils to encourage participation and help their members take this important step. The schedule for this year is as follows:

- ➤ October 18, 2025 Beaver Dam (Eastern District)
- > October 25, 2025 Baraboo (Western District)
- > January 17, 2026 Manitowoc (Eastern District)
- > April 11, 2026 De Pere (Eastern District)
- > April 25, 2026 Marshfield (Western District)

We urge councils to begin identifying worthy candidates now. Early planning allows time for mentorship, preparation, and securing the required paperwork, especially the Fourth Degree Membership Document (Form 4).

Clarifying Council Responsibilities for Form 4

To avoid delays and confusion, it is vital to understand each party's role in the Form 4 process. The council Financial Secretary confirms that a candidate is a Third Degree Knight in good standing and signs Section 8 of the form. The completed Form 4 is then forwarded to the assembly's Faithful Navigator and Faithful Comptroller, who review it, present it to the assembly for approval, and forward it with payment to the District Master.

While the council plays an essential verification role,





the assembly ultimately bears responsibility for ensuring that the Form 4 is properly completed, signed, and transmitted with payment to the District Master well before the exemplification date. Clear communication between councils and assemblies is key to welcoming candidates without delay.

Partnering for the Warrior to Lourdes Pilgrimage

This year, we invite councils and assemblies to unite in support of the Warrior to Lourdes Pilgrimage, a powerful outreach that brings wounded, ill, and injured military personnel and their caregivers on pilgrimage to Lourdes, France. Sponsored in part by the Knights of Columbus, this program embodies the Fourth Degree's commitment to faith and patriotism.

Assemblies can organize fundraising events, while councils can help identify and sponsor worthy candidates, especially Catholic veterans within their parishes. Working together on this cause strengthens the bonds between councils and assemblies while offering our veterans a life-changing spiritual experience. The extra \$25 you pay for the plate is **tax deductible** if you itemize on Schedule A. More information here.



WELCOME TO FALL and the onethird mark of the Fraternal Year. Hope your Community and Youth programs are going well so far. You should have placed your orders for the Supreme/State BOGO Coats for Kids Drive. If not, see the State website for details and contact State

Coordinator PSD Corey Coonan soon to get in on the next State order. In any event, there's still plenty of time to arrange for your coats and/or other supplies to make for a successful drive around Black Friday or in December/January when the need is great.

October also makes a great time to participate in the Bright Futures new Community program. Organize a fundraiser now for your parish school and students. Use the money in the November/December Holiday period to purchase gifts or supplies or needed equipment for the school, teachers and staff, career support programs, religious education classes, etc.

The other new program, Celebrating Our Catholic Heritage, could also come into play. In October, it's a good opportunity to make the plans and secure the supplies to help your Latino parishioners to celebrate the November Remembrance Month, Our Lady of Guadalupe in December or Christmas with a Posada program. Fall is also a golden opportunity to do a fundraiser for a donation to Habitat, toward the purchase of wheelchairs for the Global Wheelchair Mission, or to fund that difference making Helping Hands project you've been thinking about doing for the parish, community at large or someone in need, especially with another local organization. Work with neighboring Councils or the entire District to increase your impact! See the Supreme website for ideas on where you can help.

Fall is the time where we really start to ramp up our Youth programs. PPK and fall Soccer local contests should be finished by October 1. Diocesan PPK Contests are set for Green Bay, Madison, La Crosse and Superior Dioceses. See the State website for details (Milwaukee – contact Dan Teter). As always, be sure that your local Council PPK winners have completed accurate green travel cards to present at registration to the officials at the Diocesan PPK Contests. Also remember that they should bring their own practice balls. The State Finals will be Saturday, November 1 at Newman High School in Wausau. Registration and practice 10-11 AM, announcements and start 11:15 AM. All local Soccer results should be sent to your Diocesan Program Coordinator and to me.

Catholic Citizenship Essay Contest materials should be in the hands of schools, Faith Formation Directors, parents, media by the end of September for grades 8-12. Students write essays in October and November. Due to Councils by December 15. Councils judge and send 1st, 2nd place winners from each grade level to their DPC by January 1 (more next month). The topic is "Out of the 267 popes that have led the Catholic Church, who are your 3 favorite popes and why?"

Finally, for all your Community and Youth programs, remember to file that 10784 form soon after you complete that activity. Send to Supreme and the State Forms address. You may well wish to send one to your District Deputy and keep a copy for yourself.


