BROTHER KNIGHTS ALL of the Wisconsin Jurisdiction, the weekend of June 28th – 30th we held our Summer District Deputy Organizational meeting in Marshfield. At this meeting, we officially installed he District Deputies for the new fraternal year during the Saturday evening dinner.

The meeting itself was to update the Wisconsin District Deputies on what my State's strategic plan is for the first quarter covering the July – September time frame. This plan was previously sent to Supreme and approved and is what we will be measured against as we move forward. We need a first quarter fast

As State Deputy one of my primary objectives from our Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly is to grow the order. Right now we have a quota statewide of 1,242 new members. If just 300 of our councils brought in 5 new men this year, we would achieve 1,500 new men and we would be growing the order and ensuring our future good works for another 100+ years.

Growing means in addition to new men we also need to replace the members that have passed away to maintain a net positive membership base.Over 100 members have recently passed away, and we need to insure we are replacing them with men that will carry on the good works that they have done over their years of dedicated service.

We have two issues that can hold us back from achieving our membership 2024-2025 goal:

> ▶ (1) Over the last three years, Wisconsin historically has lagged in bringing in new members during the first quarter. That puts unnecessary pressure on all councils to pick up the pace during the rest of the year. Several Councils stop meeting entirely during the summer months. But that

doesn't mean you stop inviting men to join. I don't remember inviting men during a council or officer meeting. We invite men through our everyday interactions with men and families we meet at various functions. We still attend Mass over the summer. We attend ball games, bible study groups, camping, social events, etc. Wear your KC gear and be visible as a member of the Knights. The logo on our polo shirt can stimulate a question from a potential member as to what it means. This is where you need to know how to proceed by sharing with this individual all that the Knights represent and do for families & communities and parishes, and why you joined the Knights. We must continue our recruiting efforts during the summer months.

did not recruit a single member last fraternal year and that creates more of a burden on the remaining 75% to carry the load to ensure our growth. If those 81 councils recruited at least two members last year, that would equal 162 more men and the State Council would have achieved Circle of Honor recognition. This is similar to a council achieving the STAR Council award.

We as a state leadership team are here to help and need to find the reasons for the lack of recruiting and provide whatever assistance is necessary to ensure they are continuing Blessed Father Michael McGivney's mission.

AS WE MOVE closer to the November elections, let us remember when we identify ourselves as Knights, it is important to remember that while you are free to express your opinion on issues of a political or cultural nature, you may not identify yourself as a member of the Knights of Columbus or your local council. When the Order speaks publicly about certain matters, including legislation and judicial decisions, it does so through the Communications Department at the Supreme Council. This ensures consistency and discipline in messaging. For this reason, members who wish to be heard on matters of political or cultural significance are instructed to do so as individual citizens and not as representatives of their council or the Order as a whole. 
POLITICS + SOCIAL MEDIA: KNIGHTS OF **COLUMBUS RULES**

As Catholics and members of the Knights of Columbus, we are each called to faithful citizenship—to live out our Catholic faith in our public and private lives. However, how to do this, especially when representing ourselves as Knights on social media, is not always clear.


Here are some guidelines:

- ▶ Talk about issues, not candidates. Your council's social media platforms should never endorse one specific candidate or party. Instead, share information about the pro-life movement, religious freedom, and other issues Catholics care about when they go to the polls.
- ▶ Your council can also encourage your community to register to vote with the Knights of Columbus Get Out the Vote initiative.
- ▶ If you are running for office, separate your candidacy from being a Knight. You cannot campaign as a member of the Knights of Columbus on social media or offline. The Officer's Desk Reference has a detailed guide on conducting yourself as a Knight when running for political office.

▶ Be positive and polite online (and in person!). A gracious and charitable attitude when using social media goes a long way.



process. Here's how you do that:

- 1) Plan now for where, when you'll be doing your Coats for Kids Drive and make arrangements with that church, school, shelter, organization, etc. accordingly. Get your funding in order. Determine where you'll get your coats from, about how many you'll need including signs. Do likewise for any other items you may be handing out as well (scarves, mittens/gloves, hats, snowpants, boots, etc.). Hold needed fundraisers for the capital you'll need to do this.
- 2) Likewise, summer's a great time to do a brat fry, pancake breakfast, bowl-a-thon or golf outing, ice cream social, etc. to raise money for Global Wheelchairs, a Habitat for Humanity project or a local Council in need of money as a result of recent storms or floods.

It's only \$150 per wheelchair so a lot can be done there. Get the brothers together to work a day or a week at a nearby Habitat project or their Re-Store facility. Contact your State Disaster Prep Chair Paul

- Shepherd, the grand Knight of Councils where recent disasters took place or State Office to see where your donations are needed. You can also check to see that plans and supplies for disaster preparations and reaction in your parish or community are in order.
- 3) Check with your pastor or parish leadership team if you haven't already done so at your annual or semi-annual Evaluation and Planning Meeting with them, to see what projects around the parish, school need doing that you can lead or assist with. Likewise, do so with your community leadership or other civic organizations. This can go along way toward fulfilling your Helping Hands program needs.
- 4) During these summer months, it's not at all too early to run your Punt, Pass, Kick and/or Soccer Challenge contests rather than waiting until September. Diocesan Contests will again be held in mid-October and the State Finals, while still TBA, will likely be held in De Pere on either Nov. 2 or 9.

The theme for this year's Catholic Citizenship Essay Contest has been announced by Supreme. It is "What are the 2 most important virtues for an elected leader to possess and why? How can you determine if the leader has those virtues?". Order your materials now from Supplies



Online for the contest and arrange to get them and needed information to your schools, religious education and homeschool programs by Labor Day or before. The contest runs October 1 to November 30 with essays due to Councils no later than December 15. Winners are due to Diocesan Program Coordinators by December 31.

If you can get these things accomplished as outlined above, you'll be off to a great start for the new Fraternal Year and well on your way to doing a great job for your Community Faith in Action and Youth programs for 2024-25. HOW TO WRITE ARTICLES

Newsworthy • Broad Appeal • Concide • Complete • Factual • Accurate Answers the Questions: Who, What, When, Where, Why, & How

- ▶ Articles should contain a minimum of **300 words** (<u>ideal</u>) but no more than **600 words max.** Articles that are longer than this may be shortened by the editor.
- > Articles should be submitted to the State Secretary by email as a Word document attahment.
 - ▶ PDF submissions are for **ads** or **promotions**, not **articles**.
- ▶ Pictures need to be sent separately as an attachment and the original pictures. Include photo information and credits. **Please do not format them in any way; we will do it.** Do not embed them within your Word document. Consider providing photos whenever possible. It makes the newsletter more interesting to look at and read.
- ▶ Articles need to be brief, highly relevant, and actionable.
- ▶ At a minimum, Who, What, When and Where needs to be in the **first** paragraph.
- ▶ Articles need to be brief, to-the-point and **of interest** to the entire State Council:
 - What is the event/activity about?
 - Whom did it benefit?
 - What was the result?
 - Who are the key players/Knights?
- ▶ Similar story submissions will be consolidated/batched into one article by the editor.
- ▶ Authors must submit **on time** for each issue, which is the **last day of the calendar month.** Late submissions will be placed farther down the newsletter or not published.
- ▶ Proofread your article carefully for spelling and grammar before sending (use spellcheck or a software such as Grammarly). **Advice:** read your articles out loud to get a sense of tone.
- ▶ Please name your filenames with your name, title, and newsletter month (e.g. Hopper, Joshua Editor Jan24).
- Any questions may be submitted to Joshua Hopper, Editor, at jjhoppermusic@gmail.com. I always accept feedback and recommendations on ways I can improve the newsletter, though I can not guarantee all ideas will be able to be implemented.
