



- ▶ Pictures are great additions to articles to create interest! If you include pictures, please send them as separate, clearly labeled documents. Include photo information and credits. Please do not format or embed them in any way.
- ▶ With the new merger of the newsletter and the Badger Bulletin, don't feel obligated to provide an article every month. If you do not have anything new to add for our membership, it's okay to go a while without an article.
- ▶ Articles must submit on time for each issue, which is the


- last day of the calendar month. Late submissions will be inserted in the following month's newsletter.
- Proofread your article carefully for spelling and grammar before sending (use spellcheck or a software such as Grammarly). Advice: read your articles out loud to get a sense of tone.
- ▶ There is no need to put two or more spaces after periods for new sentences. That is an outdated method!
- Please name your filenames with your name, title, and newsletter month (e.g. Hopper, Joshua_Editor_ Jan24).

ON THE COVER:

St. Valentine is venerated in the Catholic Church and is widely associated with his namesake holiday, Valentine's Day, which is celebrated on February 14. He lived in the 3rd Century and was said to have administered to the faithful during the Christian persecutions in the Roman Colosseum. His patronage is Terni (a city in Italy), epilepsy, and beekeepers. In circa 269, St. Valentine was martyred and buried on the Via Flaminia. While still venerated in the Catholic Church and other Christian denominations, contradictory accounts of the details surrounding his life resulted in his feast day being removal from the Roman Catholic Church calendar in 1969.

GREETINGS TO ALL AS we continue through the year 2025. I hope everyone had a Blessed Christmas & a Safe, Healthy and Happy New Year holiday.

In December, we held our Mid-Year Winter District Deputy Organizational Meeting in Stevens Point to bring our District Deputies up to date and to review their progress with their assigned councils for the first half of this fraternal year, and what direction we all need to pursue going into the second half.

Our goal is to stay On Mission with Blessed Father Michael McGivney's vision for the Knights of Columbus, providing Charity, Unity, Fraternity and to continue growing to ensure we are here to help those less fortunate for many years to come.

We were honored to have Past State Deputy (1998-2000) Wenzel Felber Jr. speak at our meeting. During PSD Wenzel's term, the Wisconsin Jurisdiction was at 40,000 plus members strong, and every council and district was active in fulfilling the vision of Blessed Father Michael McGivney.

Since that time our membership has declined to approximately 34,000 mostly due to many of our senior members passing on and taking a place with our Lord in heaven. May they all Rest in Peace.

We also realize the period of time that we all delt with the Covid epidemic which had an impact as well as we stopped meeting together, going to Mass, inviting new men to join and our community access was extremely limited.

The good news is that we are growing again. Last year over 90,000 men joined the order worldwide and Supreme expects to easily pass that number this year worldwide. Young men are willing to join.

A recent survey by Supreme noted over 2,000,000 young men would be interested in joining a fraternal organization, and the reason they have not joined is because they were never asked.

I will be directing our state team to see what may have changed in Wisconsin over the years that has hindered use from maintaining that prior membership level. Your input is welcomed as well.

Supreme continues to offer a large variety of programs & webinars for us covering Life, Community, Family, and Programs in general to promote reasons for families to join and to get the men and their families back into supporting & living their faith & returning to Sunday Mass as a family.

The other area I will be addressing is how our state organizational structure is currently functioning in supporting each other and you, our entire membership in a timely & responsive manner.

We still have some open District Deputy & Diocesan Membership & Program Coordinator positions to fill and as a result those currently serving are spread too thin trying to cover those areas in addition to their own responsibilities. If you have the desire and interest in becoming more involved in our mission, let me know and I would be more than happy to discuss what opportunities are available.



2025 State Convention

2025 WISCONSIN STATE

CONVENTION is fast approaching, and plans are well underway. Who should attend the Convention? Chapter II, Section 12 of the Supreme Constitution provides that the State Council shall consist of two representatives of each of the subordinate councils within the State, and it is beneficial that each subordinate council in good standing have two representatives at the State Council Convention meeting each year. The State Council is not just the Officers. The State Council is all of us and your local Council needs to be represented.

Wisconsin State Bylaws ask that each subordinate council in

Wisconsin send two delegates to the convention.

- ▷ Delegates: Council shall have two (2) Delegates. Delegates must be the Grand Knight and a Past Grand Knight.
- ➤ Alternates: Council may have two (2) Alternates. Alternates can be any Third Degree member of the Council.

The Convention Delegate Certification Form, that was included in the forms packet, distributed by your District Deputy, is used to identify your Delegates and Alternates. It should be completed and returned to the State Office immediately after your council elects its Delegates and Alternates. The form is due by March 15, 2025.

Please know that each subordinate council in the Wisconsin Jurisdiction of the Knights of Columbus in good standing at the time of the 2025 State Council Meeting shall be entitled to have mileage reimbursed for the two Delegates who attend said State Council meeting at the rate established by the Supreme Council. The calculation will be from the distance necessarily traveled from the city in which their council is located to the convention and return, said expenses to be paid directly to said Council.

Please communicate this good information to your Council and make plans today.

THE FOURTH DEGREE OF the

Wisconsin Knights of Columbus has two scheduled exemplifications in the months of April and May - April 12, 2025 on the Eastern Side (Kenosha) and May 3, 2025 on the Western Side. Both exemplifications will be special events honoring the 125th Anniversary of the Fourth Degree of the Knights of Columbus. These will be historic celebrations at each location with the goal of 125 (or more) new candidates at each location. Your challenge is to find those men that will become Sir Knights at these exemplifications. Master Jack Wrbanich and Master Duane Zaborowski realize that this is a large number of men as candidates, but we have the full support of the State Officers as well as Supreme. We ask all Assembly leaders to recruit 1-5 candidates to send to these events. We also ask each Council Grand Knight and Financial Secretary to also recruit 1-2 candidates to become Sir Knights. If everyone makes this attempt, we will be successful in achieving the goals set by Supreme. Please invite them to take the degree. And if no one asks you directly – the Masters of Eastern and Wisconsin are asking you now!

If your Assembly or your Council has brother knights interested in joining the Fourth Degree, please contact Master Jack Wrbanich or Master Duane Zaborowski about the situation. Master Duane has a special exemplification scheduled on Sunday, January 12, 2025 near Superior. We will bring in Brother Knights into the 4th degree. If you can make that event, please reach out to Master Duane. This might be one of the final times to participate in the "old" exemplification as the degree will change effective February 23, 2025. Both the Eastern Master and Western Master will consider scheduling a local exemplification to get men into the 4th degree especially taking into account your location. We want the large exemplifications to draw large numbers of members, especially this year with the 125 challenge. But we also want to get men into the 4th degree. Please talk to your area Master to get more information.

The Fourth Degree is currently in the final two months of conducting a census of the entire membership of the Knights of Columbus, not just 4th degree but



ALL Knights, for establishing a record of service in the Korean and Vietnam Wars. We would also like to document service of deceased members for these two wars. For the Korean War, you need to have served between June 25, 1950 - July 27, 1953 and have been on permanent assignment or on temporary duty for 30 consecutive days or 60 nonconsecutive days within the country of Korea. For the Vietnam War, you must have served between July 3, 1965 - March 28, 1973 and have been on permanent assignment or temporary duty for at least 30 consecutive days or 60 non-consecutive days in combat with a unit directly supporting military operations in Southeast Asia.

If your Assembly has not reached out to you (or your Council), please reach out to either your Assembly or to one of the Masters with the above information. We will need to know the years/dates in service and the branch of service

The Masters have a deadline of February 28th to submit this information to Supreme.

Members of the Patriotic Degree are an integral part of the Order, and we serve our brother Knights, we proudly foster patriotism in each nation in which we are active and we act on what is right and honorable. Being an honor guard is only part of the 4th Degree. The uniform is what makes us visible but it is the other things that we do that will make us more visible as Knights. Without the uniform, you can still participate in funerals, masses, meals, helping the parish and the priests by doing some activities as 4th degree and others

with Council members. There is nothing that says a 4th degree Assembly cannot do a fundraiser for a pregnancy center and get the matching funds from Supreme. Help at a VA Center, work with your local Veteran groups, participate in the Valentines for Vets program with your local schools and deliver them to a veteran's home. These are a few examples of things you can do without the uniform.

Honor Flights from the state of Wisconsin will be resuming in the spring – stay tuned to future newsletters for exact dates and locations. You can support Honor Flights by making donations to support a veteran being on the flight, being in attendance when the flight returns from Washington DC and greeting their return or write letters to be given to the veterans at Mail Call on the flight.

Finally, a word to our Faithful leaders of our Fourth Degree

Assemblies. Remember, it is never too early to start completing the paperwork for the various awards such as the Patriotic Award and the Civic Award. The District Masters do realize that you do all this work and don't always get recognition for it. We know it is not about the recognition here on earth, but it does matter to Supreme. We have 55 Assemblies in the state of Wisconsin, we should have all 55 Assemblies receive one or both of the above awards which could then be delivered to your assembly by the Masters. It only takes a few minutes of your time to complete the paperwork. AND – remember to complete two more forms – a listing of your new Assembly officers by August 1st and your annual Assembly audit report. These last two are mandatory. Please complete them as soon as possible.

THE EUCHARIST REVIVAL IS

continuing. Last summer's Eucharistic Procession was just the beginning. This year starting at the doors of St. Peters, Pope Francis opened the doors starting the Jubilee Year. The Supreme Knight in consultation with the papacy decided to use the picture that hangs in the Gesu in Rome painted in 1767 by Pompeo Batoni as the next Icon. This Icon of the Sacred Heart of Jesu goes well with the Eucharistic Revival as it depicts the Suffering of Jesus for everyone and shows that Jesus is truly alive in the Eucharist. In addition to the adoration of the icon, we as Knights are asked to dedicate ourselves and our families to the Sacred Heart.

The great tradition of opening the Holy Door began when Pope Francis opened the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica on December 24, 2024, to open the Jubilee year. Pilgrims passing through the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica during the Holy Year 2025, going to confession, receiving Holy Communion and praying for the intentions of the pope can receive an indulgence. Other Holy Doors are

now open at the Rome basilicas of St. John Lateran, St. Mary Major, and St. Paul Outside the Walls. For pilgrims who cannot travel abroad, bishops around the world are expected to designate their Cathedrals or a popular Catholic shrine as special places of prayer for the Holy Year pilgrims.

Sacred Heart Icon. The Sacred Heart Icons have arrived in Wisconsin and we are currently waiting for the literature that will accompany the Icon which was promised by mid-February. Beginning in March, we will start to rotate the icons for one week in each Council to allow the maximum exposure in the parishes that the Council services.

The service, called "Sacred Heart Holy Hour," should include the exposition of the Blessed Sacrament. Each service begins with song, scripture readings, reflections, the Divine Mercy Chaplet, the litany of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, an act of consecration to the Sacred Heart, benediction, and ends with concluding prayers. In the event that you have a Mass with the Sacred Heart icon, the scripture reading can be substituted or combined with daily scripture readings per the guidance of your Pastor. Each icon comes with a log book. Please ensure it is signed and secured in its case so that it can travel with the icon

Included in the literature will be 200 Sacred Heart, Holy Hour

Booklets in English, Sacred Heart Prayer Cards and Sacred Heart Litany Prayer Cards. These can be ordered at no cost by the council if the supply is slowly being depleted or you if there is a need for Spanish editions. They are currently working on French and Polish but these are not currently available.

You can find detailed instructions as well as samples of posters and news releases on Supreme's web site under Pilgrim Icon Program.

Remember, as with all faith programs, discusses the services with your pastor before the icon arrives at your location. When you do your service do not forget to invite the 4th Degree Honor Guard. They are the visible arm of the Knights of Columbus.

The actual schedule for the icon is included in this newsletter. A member of the State team will help with the transfer to the first Council, which includes the Cathedral of each Diocese in Wisconsin so the initial Council should communicate with their Bishop's staff on its arrival. The transfer between Councils will be the responsibilities of both the transferring and receiving grand Knights who may be assisted by their District Deputy. I spent many hours trying to develop the best route with the fewest inconveniences. I decided seven days with the icon provides each council with enough flexibility to suit their needs.

Home Enthronement. The Home Enthronement Program allows individual families to enthrone an Image of the Sacred Heart in their Home and consecrate their family to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. A booklet explaining this program can be found on the same page as the Sacred Heart Program.

The ceremony of enthronement contained in the booklet, which can be used by families to dedicate themselves and their homes to the Sacred Heart, is based on a version widely promoted in the early 20th century through the work of Father Mateo Crawley-Boevey, SS.CC., who emphasized the role of enthronement in fostering a Christ-centered family life. 16X20 images of the Sacred Heart Icon will be available on- line for \$1.00 each and framed Images for \$20.00 each. Watch supplies online for when these are available and consider ordering samples to

display at your parishes for taking orders prior to receiving the icon at your parish. Councils that promote the Home Enthronement with the Sacred Heart Icon will receive two points when they complete the from 10784.

Silver Rose. Wisconsin will Receive the Silver Rose from Iowa on July 13th and will turn it over to Illinois on August 9th, so I am taking requests for the Silver Rose. The final schedule will be released prior to our State convention as usual.

Priority for hosting the Silver Rose will be given to the Hispanic Councils given that they did not host last year and Our Lady of Guadalupe has special significance for those of Hispanic ancestry. Remember, we have over three hundred councils in Wisconsin. Unless we get the Silver Rose for a longer period of time, only 24 councils will be able to host.

If you have a donor who wants the tax write off, have him or her send their donation either to Safe Haven Baby Boxes, Inc. and have them earmark it for a Baby Box in Wisconsin, or to Pro-Life Wisconsin, with Baby Box in the memo line of your check.

2. Get the ball rolling in your community to have one installed! Start with your fire chief. These boxes must be installed in an area that is manned 24/7/365 – which usually means a police station, hospital ER or the local fire station.
